What is Kenosha County Youth As Resources?

Kenosha County Youth As Resources (YAR) is a grant-giving program which funds youth-designed, youth-led community service projects in Kenosha County. Youth, with guidance from adults, determine the project they believe will address a need in their community.

Youth groups may apply to Kenosha County Youth As Resources for grants of up to \$500, which may be used to purchase supplies for their project, but may not be used to pay for volunteer time. The YAR Board reads all applications and invites youth groups to present their proposals directly to the board.



In 2014-15, YAR funded 13 projects, disseminating \$5,680 for community service. All funds for YAR projects are derived from United Way contributions.

The following projects were funded:

Instrument Locker Rebuild - \$500

Troop 525, Boy Scouts of America

Members of the Troop 525 of the Boy Scouts of America organized to re-build instrument lockers at Bullen Middle School. The goal of this project was to create a more suitable space for storing musical instruments at the school, and to make more space for teaching and learning.

Park Benches on the Bike Trail - \$500

Troop 505, Boy Scouts of America

Members of the Troop 505 of the Boy Scouts of America built several benches along a 3.5 mile bike trail in Kenosha. These benches provide a place to rest for residents walking or riding their bicycles on the trail.

Native American Interpretive Trail - \$160

Troop 381, Boy Scouts of America

Youth in the Troop 381 of the Boy Scouts of America organized to build a Native American Interpretive Trail at Silver Lake Park. The purpose of this project is to preserve the material remains of the Potawatomi culture in the site, and to provide a scenic and informative experience for visitors.

Just Us Kids - \$500

Lakeview Technology Academy

Students from Lakeview Technology Academy collected toys and cash donations to personally deliver gifts for hospitalized children during the 2014 Holiday season. The group also hosted a seasonal book drive in order to be able to read to the children during their visits to the hospital.

Blanket Tying - \$360

Bristol Challenge 4-H club

Members of the Bristol Challenge 4-H club made tie-dye blankets and donated them to the Shalom Center and the Sharing Center, to be distributed among the homeless citizens of Kenosha. This project sought to help homeless residents stay warm during this past winter season.

Care Net Family Resource Center- \$500

Kenosha Christian Life School National Junior Honor Society

Members of the Kenosha Christian Life School National Junior Honor Society purchased a variety of essential baby items to be donated to the Care Net Family Resource Center in Kenosha. The youth involved in the project did all the shopping and delivery. The project sought to help young mothers by reducing the initial financial burden of having to buy all the necessary items for newborn babies.

Gazebo that Guides - \$500

ELCA Outreach Center

The youth involved in this project planned and build a gazebo at the ELCA Outreach Center, and provided a new space where the clients of Center could gather to chat, pray, or mediate.

Hope Gardens - \$480

Salem United Methodist Church

Youth from the Salem United Methodist Church volunteered to cultivate enriched raised-bed garden on church land. The fresh produce from this garden will be donated to the Trevor Sharing Center, where they will be distributed to families in need.

Kind Kids - \$380

Roosevelt Elementary Youth Power

Youth from the Roosevelt Elementary Youth Power distributed activity care bags to children and adults who are undergoing medical treatment. They also helped sort and pack food for those who benefit from the Shalom Center food pantry.

Junior Optimist Club Senior Visit - \$300

Kenosha Area Junior Optimist Club, Randall Consolidated School

Students, from the Kenosha Area Junior Optimist Club coordinated with the Senior Center to plan and hold a series of bingo game days. The youth personally hosted the days, and provided prizes and refreshments for the participants. They hosted three bingo game days for our seniors citizens.

Teen Reach Adventure Camp (TRAC) - \$500

Journey Church, Kenosha Campus

35 youth member of the Journey Church congregation organized a camp for teenage youth in foster care, where they could engage in fun activities and meet other foster care teens. An average of 100 youth benefited from this project.

CDS Prom - \$500


Indian Trail High School
