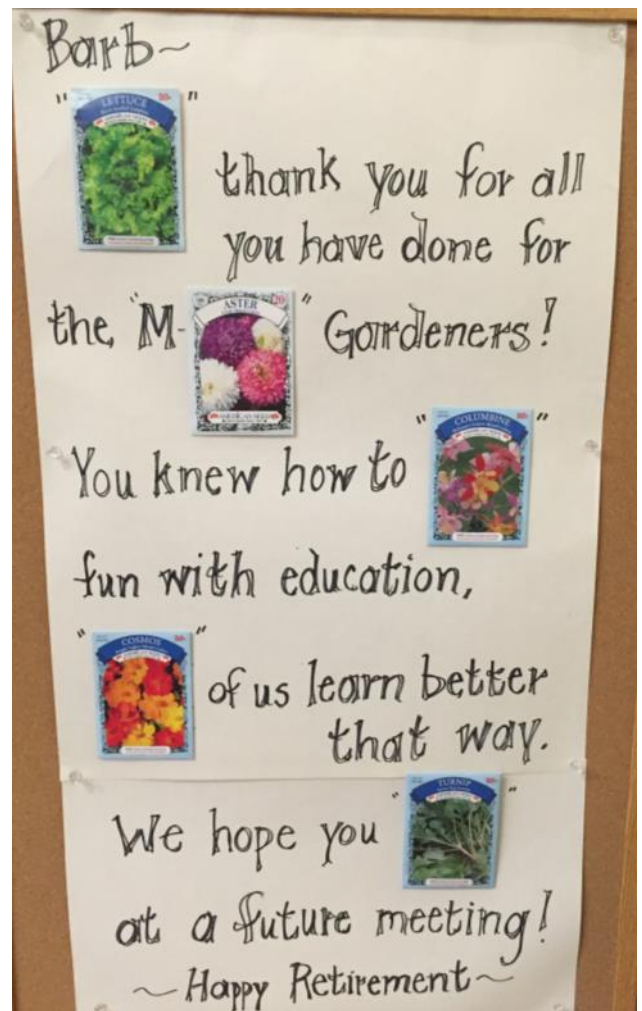


The Racine Kenosha Master Gardener volunteers presented Barb Larson with a memory book and poster at the August meeting to celebrate her career as an educator and horticulturist.

## Project Update: Kemper Center and Anderson Art Center Gardens

Last fall after the death of Master Gardener Diane Holzschuch, coordinator and planner for the Kemper Center gardens, 4 current Master Gardeners worked on the plan for the gardens this past spring. Limited by time and available flowers we duplicated the plan of 2015 with a few additions.

When work began in May we had 7 Master Gardeners and 6 volunteers to get the weeding and planting done. We spend Tuesday from 1 - 4 pm or later doing the usual maintenance. These beds have flourished even in the dry weather with extra watering done by Bob Shaffer from Kemper.

When there is time on Tuesdays, we have done a considerable amount of transplanting through out the Center from the northern end ( street to lake) to the Secret Garden south border of the Anderson Art Center. As we work we see where plants need to be moved. When weather permits we transplant or put it on hold for the fall. We are planning for 2017 with grid diagrams of each of the 26 beds and photos to accompany the diagrams.

We have 17 acres of historical gardens which are part of the Kenosha County Park system. We're planning to fulfill Diana's idea of gardens of perennials, shrubs and trees that are low maintenance and splashes of color from annuals. The color and scheme for next year is yet to be determined by the group.

We are grateful for the hard work of the dedicated volunteers. They have furnished some plants and seeds for the beds. Hopefully as we continue to work together, share ideas and plants and voice our opinions our plan will be achieved. We all work together and are capable of knowing what needs to be done. Come visit some Tuesday afternoon.
