Landscape & Grounds Maintenance Short Course

1:00 p.m.—**Crown Restoration Pruning of Storm Damaged Trees;** Storm damage is a common issue faced by urban tree managers. Sometimes trees are severely damaged and need to be removed. Many more, however, receive moderate levels of damage and can be saved.
